### DEAD MEN TALKING FREE SPEECH

A Democratic Palm Beach prosecutor is after conservative talk show host Rush Limbaugh. A Republican chairman of the Federal Communications Commission is after shock jock Howard Stern.

Limbaugh, who is accused of taking illicit prescription medications, without being indicted, is under a Florida state investigation. His medical records have been subpoenaed by the investigators.

Democrats revelled in the personal problems of Limbaugh. Limbaugh is the conservative think tank for Republican politics. The Democrats underestimated his influence during the last elections. They attack him with the non-filed criminal charge in an effort to discredit, disable or sidetrack his conservative views to his audience.

## AIR AMERICA GROUNDS SELF

CHICAGO--(4/ 04) It only took two weeks for the Liberal Democratic Business Plan in the Real World to come to a crashing halt.

It usually takes a


restaurant a year to fail. This new radio network has probably set a media record for failure.

has described himself as a Dead Man Walking. Congress was in the midst of increasing the FCC indecency fines from \$27,500 per violation to \$500,000. It is punitive administrative hammer that the FCC is now swinging toward broadcasters.

Stern's employer, Infinity Broadcasting, can afford to pay a huge fine, but it cannot afford to lose its broadcast licenses. The whole subject matter of "community standards" and broadcast taste now resides in the minds of 5 FCC commissioners. Stern believes cannot challenge any FCC action in the courts because the FCC could hinder, delay or interfere with Infinity's licenses.

He predicts that the FCC will levy a record fine against him, and his employer will be forced to fire him.

The First Amendment protects free speech. You have the right to speak your mind. The government is not allowed to preempt your thoughts. Unpopular views are protected speech. The question of obscenity is a question of community standards as viewed as a local court decision.

But the FCC has taken it upon itself to be the national broadcast censor. Other media companies, who consolidated licenses into an concentrated few major players, have chilled, fired or restricted their programming personalities, some under a "zero tolerance" policy. The FCC now looms as the Big Brother of Broadcasting.

Power hungry, the FCC now is seeking to regulate "cable" television. The jurisdiction of the FCC is the "public" broadcast airwaves. Cable is not on the public airwaves; it is a private transmission through wires to home customers who pay for the programs.

The FCC is also drafting rules on the conduct of the Internet. Again, the Internet is a private person to person communications protocol. It does not use the public airwaves.

But the FCC has gotten the notion that it regulations communications, it should rule over all communication mediums. This is a dangerous trend.

Congress passed alleged Campaign Finance Reform legislation believing that the U.S. Supreme Court would rule it unconstitutional as violative of free speech. To the amazement of the public, broadcasters and legal scholars, the Supreme Court upheld the provisions that restricted money donations, types of advertising, and a speech blackout period prior to federal elections.

It is clearly a massive defeat for those in the free speech area. Political speech is one of the key issues our founders fought and died for in the Revolutionary War. The drafters of the Constitution put no restrictions on the policy of free speech.

The net effect is that the campaign reform bill further cements the power of incumbent politicians to get re-elected. Incumbents have the power of their office and news generating ability to work through any advertising and speech restrictions.

The federal government is now intruding itself as the regulator of political, informa-

tional and entertainment speech of the public.

It is ironic that Limbaugh and Stern are both targets because of their exercise of their free speech rights. Democrats want to silence Limbaugh in order to shift the debate to more leftist media opinion makers. The right wing fundamentalist Republicans want to ban Stern's sexually crude radio program.

The print media and the internet publishers have not made the connection. The majority of print publications are owned or controlled by broadcasting chains. Publicly traded company management can not afford to lose the more profitable money machines of radio-television stations because of negative press in their papers against their regulators.

This is also the problem with concentrated media ownership. The government can influence and bully the big players who control almost 50% of the information outlets in the United States. There is no diversity of ideas in a culture dominated by national media chains that are afraid of out-ofcontrol regulators.

America is free falling toward a moralcultural war. Just as the Islamic factions in Iraq are at odds with each other's religious doctrine, the US is pulling itself into a bloody power grab. It is a different form of class warfare. It is the elite, career political class based in Washington D.C. seeking to control all aspects of our lives.

Think about it. Why is there any reason why the federal government needs to regulate "fast food?" Or seek legislation on baseball's testing for steroids? These are non-issues in the scope of life--- but those elite pols have nothing better to do than flex their power and clout. Power is the most addictive substance known to mankind. We are getting to a drug overdosed frenzy.

Homeland security and the War on Terror has the Republicans suspending civil rights to alleged enemy suspects. The government will protect us from future terror acts in exchange for a lessening of the Fourth Amendment rights individuals have against unwarranted government intrusions. The Democrats cried foul, briefly, over the Homeland security army being massed within our borders. The Dems had the patent on "controlling" people's ambitions and goals. The party is the party of special interest entitlements. A snake oil salesmen's pitch of miracle solutions in exchange for their votes and tax dollars.

The Bush administration has outspent even the Democratic machine. New entitlements and huge budget deficits by Bush has made Democrats antsy. They have to find new ways to make campaign issues to regain control and power in Washington.

To appeal to the conservative base, Republicans are marching against sin, indecency and other forms of "bad speech."


The more the calendar progresses forward under the guise of enlightenment, the more it is apparent that nothing really changes.

Mideast. It would not be surprising to find French, German or Russian equipment and technolthat ogy skirted the pre-War blockade. But the true test will be


w h e t h e r Saddam will
